Application for: A premises licence to be granted under the Licensing Act 2003

Purpose of the Report

The report advises Members of an application for a Premises Licence to be granted under the Licensing Act 2003, made by Mr Richard Balfour-Lynn, in respect of the premises Hush Heath Winery, Hush Heath Estate, Five Oak, Lane, Staplehurst, Kent, TN12 0HX in respect of which 7 representations (Appendix C) have been received from an Interested Parties.

Issue to be Decided

1. Members are asked to determine whether to i) grant subject to conditions consistent with the operating schedule modified to such extent as considered appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and any mandatory condition, ii) grant excluding any of the licensable activities applied for, iii) grant refusing to specify a premises supervisor, or iv) reject the application.

Background

- 2. The relevant sections are Part 3 ss 16-19, 23 & 24 of The Licensing Act 2003 and section 4 of The Licensing Act 2003 in particular the Licensing Objectives:
 - The prevention of crime and disorder;
 - Public Safety
 - The prevention of public nuisance; and
 - The protection of children from harm
- 3. The application has been correctly advertised, for sale of alcohol, in the local press and a notice displayed on the premises for the required period.
- 4. 7 representations have been received from Interested Parties
- 5. The table below illustrates the relevant representations which have been received

Mr Balfour-Lynn's initial application included live music, recorded music, dancing and late night refreshment and made reference to being used as a wedding venue. Many of the objections received refer to that application and the issues that they state would arise as a result of that application. Since then the application has been amended to remove all the licensable activities except the sale of alcohol. The amended days and times for the sale of alcohol were confirmed by Mr Balfour Lynn in an e-mail received by licensing on 18.2.2013. Mr Balfour-Lynn's amendments were made after the advert had appeared in the Wealden Ad and after discussions with the objectors about their concerns around the wedding venue proposals, he explained to the objectors that the hours to the general public would be limited but the overall hours requested were necessary, especially in respect of telephone orders and internet sales in order to remain lawful. After these discussions Mr A Dimmock withdrew his first letter and replaced it with his 2nd letter.

- 6. Members are advised that applications cannot be refused in whole or in part, or conditions attached to the licence unless it is appropriate to do so to promote the licensing objectives.;
- 7. The Operating Schedule submitted by the Applicant has addressed the licensing objectives in the following manner:
 - a) General all four licensing objectives

HUSH HEATH ESTATE IS A FAMILY OWNED FARM AND WINERY MAINTAINED TO THE HIGHEST OF STANDARDS WITH LIMITED ACCESS TO THE PUBLIC, GOOD SECURITY, GOOD PARKING AND IN AN EXTREMELY REMOTE AREA. THE PRINCIPALS OF SECURITY AND SAFETY WILL BE EXTENDED IN ALL DEALINGS WITH THE PUBLIC.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

LIMITED OPENING HOURS. GOOD SECURITY, ALARMS AND CCTV CAMERAS. NO UNSUPERVISED ACCESS.

c) Public safety

WINERY AND VINEYARDS FROM PART OF HUSH HEATH ESTATE WHICH CARRIES OUT AN ANNUAL INDEPENDANTLY EVALUATED FARM AUDIT CALLED CMI FARM AUDIT. THIS AUDIT INCLUDES HEALTH AND SAFETY FOR THE PUBLIC VISITING THE ESTATE.

d) Prevention of public nuisance

THE SUPPLY OF ALCOHOL WILL BE RESTRICTED TO MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC TASTING SAMPLES.

e) The protection of children from harm

20. Prevention of Crime and Disorder

Concerns

The applicant should consider factors arising from the premises or the activities of their customers within the vicinity of the premises that may impact on the prevention of crime and disorder. These may include:

- Underage drinking
- Drunkenness on premises
- Public drunkenness
- Drugs
- Violent behaviour
- Anti-social behaviour

Additional Steps

The following examples of additional steps are given as examples for applicants to consider in addressing the above concerns in the preparation of their Operating Schedule, having regard to their particular type of premises or activities:-

- Effective and responsible management of premises.
- Training and supervision of staff.
- Adoption of current best practice guidance (some examples are Safer Clubbing, the National Alcohol Harm Reduction Strategy Toolkit, and other voluntary codes of practice, including those relating to drinks promotions e.g. The Point of Sale Promotions published by BBPA).
- Acceptance of accredited 'proof of age' pass cards or 'new type' driving licences with photographs, passports or an official identity card issued by H M Forces.
- Provision of effective CCTV in and around premises.
- Employment of Security Industry Authority licensed door staff. (If two or more are employed there must be at least one male and one female).
- Provision of toughened or plastic glasses.
- Provision of secure deposit boxes for confiscated items ('sin bins').
- Provision of litterbins, security measures, e.g. lighting, outside premises.

- Membership of a Pub Watch scheme.
- The current 'Chill Out Hour' operating at the late night venues in the Borough of Maidstone which is the agreement whereby late night venues cease to sell alcohol yet continue to provide music and dancing for a further hour (at a reduced volume and with the heavy bass beat removed) has proved to be a success in reducing late night crime and disorder.
- Membership of Maidsafe (Nite Net).

21. The Promotion of Public Safety

The Licensing Authority wishes to ensure the safety of everyone on licensed premises.

Concerns

Capacity

Where existing legislation does not provide adequately for the safety of the public, club members or guests, the occupancy capacity for premises and events (to include performers and staff) may be an important factor in promoting public safety. Subject to the requirements of the following paragraph the Licensing Authority will expect the issue of occupancy capacity and adequate controls of the numbers of persons on premises or attending an event to be considered by an applicant when completing an Operating Schedule. Where a relevant representation is received in respect of capacity the Licensing Authority will consider setting capacity limits in consultation with the Kent and Medway Fire and Rescue Authority for the following premises:

- Nightclubs
- Cinemas
- Theatres
- Other premises where regulated entertainment within the meaning of the Act is being provided. The Applicant might also consider the following concerns when assessing the appropriate capacity for premises or events in the Maidstone area. These could include:-
- The design and layout of the premises.
- The nature of the premises or event.
- The nature of the licensable activities being provided.
- The provision or removal of temporary structures, such as a stage or furniture.
- The number of staff available to supervise customers both ordinarily and in the event of an emergency.
- The customer profile (e.g. age, disability).
- The attendance by customers whose first language is not English.
- Availability of suitable and sufficient sanitary accommodation.
- The nature and provision of facilities for ventilation.
- The use of special effects such as lasers, pyrotechnics, smoke machines, foam machines, etc.

Where capacity is likely to be reached (such as on known busy evenings) and particularly where a special event or promotion is planned, the applicant will be expected to consider the arrangements that will be put in place to ensure that the capacity of the premises is not exceeded.

Additional Steps

The following examples of additional steps are given for applicants to consider in the preparation of their Operating Schedule, having regard to their particular type of premises or activities:-

- Suitable and sufficient risk assessments.
- Effective and responsible management of premises
- Provision of a sufficient number of people employed or engaged to secure the safety of the premises and patrons.
- Appropriate instruction, training and supervision of those employed or engaged to secure the safety of the premises and patrons.
- Adoption of best practice guidance.
- Provision of effective CCTV in and around premises.
- Provision of toughened or plastic non disposable glasses/bottles.
- Implementation of crowd management measures.

• Regular testing (and certification where appropriate)of procedures, appliances, systems etc. pertinent to safety.

22. Prevention of Public Nuisance

Licensed premises can cause adverse impacts on communities through public nuisance. The Licensing Authority wishes to maintain and protect the amenity of residents and other businesses from any nuisance caused by the operation of licensed premises whilst recognising the valuable cultural, social and business importance that such premises provide.

The Licensing Authority will interpret 'public nuisance' in its widest sense, and takes it to include such issues as noise, light, odour, litter and anti-social behaviour, where these matters impact on those living, working or otherwise engaged in normal activity in an area.

Concerns

When addressing the issue of prevention of public nuisance, the applicant should consider those factors arising from the premises or the activities of their customers within the vicinity of the premises that may impact on the likelihood of public nuisance. These may include:-

- The location of the premises and their proximity to residential and other noise sensitive premises, such as hospitals, hospices and places of worship.
- The hours of operation, particularly if between 23.00 and 07.00.
- The nature of activities to be provided, including whether those activities are of a temporary or permanent nature and whether they are to be held inside or outside premises.
- The design and layout of premises and in particular the presence of noise limiting features.
- The occupancy capacity of the premises.
- Last admission time.
- The steps the applicant has taken or proposes to take to ensure that staff leave the premises quietly.
- The steps the applicant has taken or proposes to take to prevent disturbance by patrons arriving or leaving the premises.
- Whether routes to and from the premises, on foot or by car or service or delivery vehicles, pass residential premises within the vicinity of the Premises.
- Whether other measures have been taken or are proposed such as the use of CCTV or the employment of registered door supervisors.
- The arrangements made or proposed for parking by patrons, and the effect of this parking on local residents.
- The likelihood of any violence, disorder or policing problems arising if a licence were granted.
- Whether taxis and private hire vehicles serving the premises are likely to disturb local residents.
- The siting of external lighting, including security lighting that is installed inappropriately.
- Whether the operation of the premises would result in increased refuse storage or disposal problems or additional litter in the vicinity of the premises and any measures or proposed measures to deal with this.
- The history of previous nuisance complaints proved against the premises, particularly where statutory notices have been served on the present licensees.

Additional Steps

The following examples of additional steps are given as examples for applicants to consider in the preparation of their Operating Schedule, having regard to their particular type of premises or activities:-

- Effective and responsible management of premises.
- Appropriate instruction, training and supervision of those employed or engaged to prevent incidents of public nuisance.

- Control of operating hours for all or parts (e.g. garden areas) of premises, including such matters as deliveries.
- Adoption of best practice guidance (e.g. Good Practice Guide on the Control of Noise from Pubs and Clubs, produced by Institute of Acoustics).
- Installation of soundproofing, air conditioning, acoustic lobbies and sound limitation devices.
- Management of people, including staff, and traffic (and resulting queues) arriving and leaving premises.
- The incorporation of measures for ensuring the safe and swift dispersal of patrons away from premises and events without causing nuisance or public safety concerns to local residents.
- Effective ventilation systems to prevent nuisance from odour.

N.B. Where relevant representations are received which the Licensing Sub Committee consider material particular consideration will be given to the impact on residential amenity of proposals for the provision of late night refreshment where these are either located in, or encourage people to move through, residential areas.

23. Protection of Children from Harm

A mandatory condition will be applied requiring access to be restricted to those who meet the required age limit in accordance with any certificate granted by the British Board of Film Classification or in specific cases the Local Authority.

The relaxation in the Licensing Act giving accompanied children greater access to licensed premises is seen as a positive step, which may bring about a social change in family friendly leisure but the risk of harm to children remains the paramount consideration. Clearly, this relaxation places additional responsibilities upon licence holders as well as upon parents and others accompanying children.

The protection of children from harm includes the protection of children from moral, psychological and physical harm and, in relation to the exhibition of films, the transmission of programmes by video or DVD. This includes the protection of children from exposure to strong language, sexual imagery and sexual expletives.

In the event of an unclassified film, then it is expected that the Licensing Authority will view the film before it is shown in the Council's area.

In certain circumstances children are more vulnerable and their needs will require special consideration. This vulnerability includes their susceptibility to suggestion, peer group influences, inappropriate example, the unpredictability of their age and the lack of understanding of danger.

The Licensing Authority recognises Kent County Council Social Services, Mid Kent Area, District Office, Bishop's Terrace, Bishop's Way, Maidstone, Kent, ME14 1AF as a body representing those responsible for, or interested in, matters relating to the protection of children from harm and competent to advise it on such matters. It is therefore, a responsible authority for the purposes of Section 13(4) and Section 69(4) of the Act.

Concerns

The applicant should consider those factors arising from the premises or the activities of their customers within the vicinity of the premises that may impact on the prevention of children from harm. These may include the potential for children to:-

- purchase, acquire or consume alcohol
- be exposed to drugs, drug taking or drug dealing
- be exposed to gambling
- be exposed to activities of an adult or sexual nature
- \bullet be exposed to incidents of violence or disorder $\begin{picture}(60,0) \put(0,0){\line(0,0){100}} \put(0,0){\line(0,0){1$

- be exposed to environmental pollution such as noise
- be exposed to special hazards such as falls from a height

Additional Steps

The following examples of additional steps are given to assist applicants. The Licensing Authority considers them to be important matters that applicants should take account of in the preparation of their Operating Schedule, having regard to their particular type of premises and/or activities:-

- Effective and responsible management of premises.
- Provision of a sufficient number of people employed or engaged to secure the protection of children from harm.
- Appropriate instruction, training and supervision of those employed or engaged to secure the protection of children from harm.
- Adoption of best practice guidance (Public Places Charter).
- Limitations on the hours when children may be present, in all or parts of the premises.
- Limitations or exclusions by age when certain activities are taking place.
- Imposition of requirements for children to be accompanied by an adult.
- Acceptance of accredited 'proof of age' cards, 'new type' driving licences with photographs, passport, an official identity card issued by HM Forces or by an EU country bearing the photograph and date of birth of bearer.

N.B. In exceptional circumstances, where necessary, and only where the licensing authority has received relevant representations, it may impose conditions restricting access or excluding children from premises or part of licensed premises:-

- a) at certain times of the day, or
- b) when certain licensable activities are taking place, or
- c) to which children aged under 16 years should have access only when supervised by an adult, or
- d) to which unsupervised children under 16 will be permitted access.

Examples of premises where these conditions may be considered include those where:-

- a) There have been convictions for serving alcohol to minors or where there is some evidence of under- age drinking.
- b) There is a known association with drug taking or dealing.
- c) There is a strong element of gambling on the premises.
- d) Entertainment of an adult or sexual nature is commonly provided.
- e) There is a presumption that children under 18 should not be allowed (e.g. to nightclubs, except where under 18 discos are being held)
- f) Licensable activities are taking place during times when children under 16 may be expected to be attending compulsory full-time education.

The Licensing Authority commends the Portman Group Code of Practice on the naming and packaging of alcoholic drinks. See www.portman-group.org.uk for further information

9. Options

Legal options open to members -

- a) GRANT the licence subject to such conditions as are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application; MODIFIED to such extent as the Licensing sub-committee considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and any relevant mandatory condition
- b) EXCLUDE from the licence any of the licensable activities applied for.

- c) REFUSE to specify a person in the licence as premises supervisor
- d) REJECT the application.
- 10. Members of the Licensing Act 2003 Licensing Sub Committee are reminded of their duty under section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to consider the crime and disorder implications of their decisions and the Licensing Authority's responsibility to co operate in the reduction of crime and disorder in the Borough

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1988 states:

"Without prejudice to any other obligation imposed on it, it shall be the duty of each authority to which this section applies to exercise its various functions with due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those function on, and the need to do all that it reasonably can prevent, crime and disorder in its area".

11. Implications Assessment

The decision should be made with regard to the Secretary of State's Guidance and the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy under the Licensing Act 2003. Where the decision departs from either the Guidance or the policy clear and cogent reasons must be given. Members should be aware that if such a departure is made the risk of appeal/challenge is increased.

12. Human Rights

While all Convention Rights must be considered, those which are of particular relevance to the application are:

- Article 8 Right to respect for private and family life
- Article 1 of the First Protocol Protection of Property
- Article 6(1) Right to Fair Hearing
- Article 10 Freedom of Expression

The full text of each Article is given in the attached Appendices

13. Conclusion

Members must ensure that the application is considered on its merits, as well as against the relevant guidance, policy and statutory framework.

15. Appeals





Dear Sir/Madam

I believe for the following reasons, the sale of alcohol from Hush Heath Winery to the general public to be completely inappropriate.

Part (1) Sale of alcohol to the general public from Hush Heath Winery.

PUBLIC SAFETY

In the farm yard outside Hush Heath Winery, there are tractors and trailers, fork lift trucks, lorries and other farm machinery in regular use.

This is a dangerous environment for the general public to be exposed to, especially when they have been consuming alcohol.

Health and Safety at work would never allow a trained employee to consume alcohol and work in this environment.

So I believe it is unfair to expose the general public to this unnecessary risk.

Inside Hush Heath Winery, there are also risks to the general public. The Winery inside is an industrial type working environment, with deep wine tanks, press, bottling plant and many harmful substances. Plus fork lift trucks in regular use. This is again not the type of environment that the general public should be exposed to especially while consuming alcohol.

THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN FROM HARM

As with the last section on public safety, inside and outside the winery. Children are at a greater risk of harm than adults because they do not see danger. You only have to take your eyes off of them for a split second and they are wandering off. This is more likely to happen if the adult supervising them is consuming alcohol. They could easily be knocked over by a fork lift truck or walk up the steps to see the tanks of wine. Again it is not a risk that should be considered.

The general public and especially children should not be exposed to an

The general public and especially children should not be exposed to an industrial/agricultural environment that has a very poor health and Safety record while consuming alcohol at the same time, a recipe for disaster.

It is not worth the risk just to buy a bottle of wine and yes Hush Heath wine is available from Marks and Spencer at no risk to the general public and their children.

THE PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

Hush Heath Winery was converted to a winery back in 2009 from an old farm building and from the outside it still has the same appearance as a farm building but inside it has very expensive machinery and equipment, plus many bottles of wine.

Passing people would have no idea of the contents of the building.

This has been its greatest asset with regards to security.

If you open a wine shop with in the winery to the general public and advertise outside, wine for sale. This will lead to a break in with in a very short period of time.

You are far better off producing the wine at the winery but selling the wine as is currently to other retailers.

THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

There would be an increase in noise.

The area is an outstanding peaceful countryside environment and yes the general public should be encouraged to enjoy the countryside i.e walking ,cycling , bird watching etc but we do not need additional noise, just for the sake of buying a bottle of wine that could be purchased from the local supermarket in town.

The roads in the area near Hush Heath winery are mainly single track country lanes with no passing points and deep drainage ditches either side of the road.

Often the only way of passing oncoming traffic is to use the verge at the side of the lanes, which are already full of mud.

This proposed increase in traffic will only increase the current problem.

Any successful retail business must have good access roads, such as A or B roads as a minimum, anything less just leads to a local nuisance and congestion.

Part (2) POTENTIAL WEDDING VENUE

APPLICATION FOR:

LIVE MUSIC , RECORDED MUSIC , DANCING , SALE OF ALCOHOL , INSIDE & OUT

The application states that the area around Hush Heath Winery is extremely remote, this is not correct.

There are 4 residential properties right next to Hush Heath winery, they are,

Plain Cottages numbers 1, 2, 3 Pristling lane also known as Snoad lane

Great Buttercup Barn Pristling lane also known as Snoad lane.

There are numerous other residential properties near by, including:

Tavern Farm, Wilden Park road
Forstal Farm, Wilden Park road
Woodside, Wilden Park road
Little Harts Heath, Hush Heath hill
Hush Heath Oast, Hush Heath hill
Birchwood House, Pristling lane also known as Snoad lane

There are many other properties near by that would be affected by this proposed application.

THE PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE:

NOISE:

The application is completely unacceptable because the properties stated and many more would be affected by extreme noise far too late at night.

The residents to the stated properties include young children and elderly people.

If the music and bar at a wedding closed at 12.00 midnight.

It would take another hour of shouting, singing, banging of car doors before all the guests had gone.

Then it would be another hour before all of the catering staff went home.

This leaves a bedtime for the elderly residents and children in the area of about 2.00am.

ROAD ACCESS:

As stated in Part (1) All the roads in the local area near Hush Heath winery are single track country lanes with no passing places and deep drainage ditches at the side of the roads.

Not only would this cause traffic chaos but will cause accidents.

At a wedding of 200 guests, you could expect 80 to 100 cars, unfortunately not all of the drivers will resist the temptation to have a drink and there are enough accidents around our lanes already.

PUBLIC SAFETY:

The fields around Hush Heath winery are very low lying and with a moderate to heavy period of rain quickly become water logged. In fact with a period of heavy rain a lake forms along the side of Five Oak lane.

This makes the whole area completely unsuitable for vehicles, the erection of marquees, even for pedestrians.

Because the area is low lying, there are deep natural ponds in the immediate area around Hush Heath winery, which would be dangerous to children.

SUITABILITY OF WEDDING VENUE:

Most wedding venues are located in an area were guests can book into a hotel for the night, close by to save the risk of driving while tired or intoxicated.

The nearest hotels to Hush Heath winery are in Maidstone or Tenterden over 10 miles away.

The roads are unsuitable for this volume of traffic.

Hush Heath winery has no main drainage and a wedding with 200 guests would be impossible. They have a cesspit but this would fill up with in a couple of hours. The electricity supply to the local area around Hush Heath winery is at its maximum capacity, when the coolers in the winery come on, the lights in the local houses opposite flicker. It would cost a fortune to upgrade.

The water supply always has low pressure and the water main would probably need replacing if the use increased.

I would assume the Fire Brigade would insist upon this if you have a venue with approximately 200 guests present.



To the Chief Licensing Officer,

It has come to our notice that an application for the sale of alcohol has been made from Hush Heath Winery, Five Oak Lane, Staplehurst TN12 0HX.

On further investigation it appears there is more to this application than meets the eye, in fact, we find it misleading under Section 158 of the Licensing Act as the requirement to advertise is mandatory and there is no mention of a music licence either pinned to the farm gate or in the press advertisement in the Wealden Advertiser. This application has masqueraded as solely a licence to sell wine, when really it embraces plans for an all-singing, all dancing wedding venue. We suggest that this application has already contravened regulations.

We would therefore ask you to veto and postpone for the time-being this application, until it can be advertised properly and discussed by all affected parties.

My wife and I have lived opposite the winery for over thirty years and it has always been an agricultural concern therefore paying no rates, unlike ourselves and the dozens of local residents who are opposed to this application and pay high community charges for the *privilege* of living in the country.

Over the years there have been various parties/functions held in this area (which by the way is not isolated) and the sound carries far and wide. This of course is acceptable on a sporadic basis as we are not killjoys, but the fact remains it is very intrusive. For many years (prior to Mr Balfour-Lynn owning the land) cubs and scouts were allowed to camp in Snoad Wood (which is even further from our house) during the summer holidays. Of course we never complained, but during the evening one could clearly hear individual voices and shouts echoing around what is a natural bowl, which amplifies all sound. The thought of a music licence being granted between 10am-midnight, 7-days a week is horrific. The buildings proposed for the site are agricultural by design and not properly sound-proofed. Add to this the fact that marquees may be used and the whole concept is totally unacceptable.

It would mean having to sleep with windows closed on hot summer nights, with revellers calling and car horns hooting until the early hours. People leaving the site would be travelling on C roads in total darkness in an area unfamiliar to them and as there is a very limited taxi service and no hotels here, it is likely some of them would risk drinking and driving.

Add to this the impact on the wildlife here. Over the years in this beautiful part of the unspoilt Kent countryside we have enjoyed watching many birds building their nests, owls, bats and buzzards overhead, hares, badgers and deer in the fields and wood – all would be disturbed, by this unnatural intrusion.

I would like to submit this opposition confident in the knowledge that every resident in the vicinity is united and opposed to Mr Balfour-Lynn's application. A petition is being organised.

We are writing to object to the above application. We live close to the winery and feel it's further development into a Wedding Venue detrimental to the area and to the local residents.

Having studied the application it appears to be deliberately vague and contradictory in explaining Mr. Balfour-Lynn's requirements and objectives. Presumably this is a phishing exercise, using the application to see "what he can get away with"!

Within page 20 of the application there are four points (b-e) which we object to. We have ignored item (a) as irrelevant.

- b) If the opening hours are to be limited why apply for opening hours of 10 24 hours? If the purpose of the application is to open a visitors centre to taste the products of the winery why mention a wedding venue? The thought of just sampling the products and not imbibing at a wedding whilst jigging to "High Ho Silver Lining" is beyond belief!
- c) Presumably this all correct, but probably irrelevant to the ambitions of the applicants, padding out the forms in our opinion. The safety of the local residents and their properties would be at danger from increased traffic on the lanes, all of which are single track. They just about cope with the traffic movements of the local farmers and their heavy machinery. We live on the corner of Five Oak Lane and Five Ash Lane and the thought of wedding attendees whizzing through the lanes following their "tasting session" is actually quite frightening. Presumably the type of guest Mr. Balfour –Lynn is hoping to attract can afford the £40 bottles (retail, more like £120 for "tasting" at a wedding!) of fizz he creates and will not be driving Morris Minors will they?
- d) Again no drinking just tasting! Does this mean that the public will be tasting while the wedding guests are drinking?
- e) Perhaps they could keep the children under lock and key and save the need for adult supervision so that they may have a longer "tasting session"?

We hope the above explains our objections and that common sense prevails, leaving the area to be enjoyed by the walkers, cyclists and residents as it is. One wonders what the Barn Owl that lives in the corner overlooking the winery will think of outside music?

Licensing Application: 13/00231/LAPRE Hush Heath Winery, Five Oak Lane, Staplehurst, Kent, TN12 0HX

We live approximately a mile from the site and, as local residents, will be affected by the granting of this licence.

The application does not provide details of the number or size of the events planned. An average UK wedding has between 100 and 200 guests and involves associated employees, suppliers and contractors. If the licence is to provide for events of this size we would have the following objections:

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The venue is in a rural area and very remote from all services. It is inaccessible other than by car. Most people would consider walking and cycling impracticable when attending a wedding at the site and an unattractive alternative in terms of both convenience and safety. Public transport does not service the route. Accommodation is not available at the site and only limited accommodation is available locally.

A large number of people leaving a licensed premises here in the early hours would have difficulty getting back to their accommodation or the station. This would significantly increase the risk of anti-social behaviour in the local area which is likely to affect us.

Public Safety

The site is serviced by single track country lanes with a low frequency of vehicle movements. The lanes have grass verges, many blind corners and limited passing places. As the primary method of access will be by car, events of this size would represent a significant increase in traffic movement including the coaches, minibuses and lorries to service the event. The increase in traffic would put additional pressures on the main routes through Staplehurst, Cranbrook and Goudhurst which already suffer from traffic issues.

The pressures on local lanes and roads will be compounded as large numbers of cars are likely to arrive and leave at the same time.

These increased levels of traffic will impact on us through noise, pollution and safety including increased congestion and road accidents.

The Prevention of Public Nuisance

Noise travels considerable distances and we will undoubtedly be affected by this. The site is in open countryside with extremely low levels of ambient noise. An increase of just five decibels over ambient noise levels could have an unacceptable impact on amenity.

The barn appears to be of a traditional steel framed construction and no details are given of current soundproofing. Also, it does not give any details as to whether doors and windows would need to be opened to provide adequate ventilation in the summer months. The plans submitted with the application show a function room able to sit 14 guests with 2 toilets. We would, therefore, assume that weddings would be hosted in an external marquee and mobile toilets provided. Neither facility could be considered adequately insulated from noise.

The application includes the playing of recorded and live music between the hours of 10.00 am and 12.00 mid-night, inside and outdoors. We are assuming that this could be amplified. This use would cause persistent and intrusive noise and would significantly reduce our ability to enjoy our own home or sleep. People arriving and leaving together and travelling on local lanes at night will also cause noise and disturbance to us.

The Protection of Children from Harm

The traffic, noise and disturbance associated with large events at the site will have a negative impact on local children and put them at an increased risk of harm.

In light of the above, we would request that any licence be granted with the following conditions:

- the size of the events be restricted to what can be comfortably accommodated within the building
- that no music should be allowed outside at any time
- no music should be audible from the boundary of the nearest residential property at a level above the ambient background noise level
- sound proofing of the building be required if necessary to achieve this
- music should cease at 9.00 pm each day

This would ensure that traffic levels remain appropriate and safe for the character of the area and music limited to a level that would not cause undue disturbance or unacceptable impact upon residential amenity.

I sent you a letter dated the 05/02/2013 with regards to this licensing application. I wish to withdraw this letter and for it not to be taken into consideration.

The reason is I believe the applicant has amended his licensing application and therefore the previous letter dated the 05/02/2013 is no longer relevant because he has withdrawn the following sections.

- (E) Live Music inside and out
- (F) Recorded Music inside and out
- (J) Dancing inside and out
- (L) Late night refreshment inside and out
- (M) Supply of alcohol inside and out 10.00 to 24.00

This now only leaves:

Section (O) The sale of alcohol from the winery.

Hours premises are open to the public.

Monday to Saturday 11.00 to 17.00

Sunday 12.00 to 17.00

I have spoken to Richard Balfour-Lynn the applicant and owner of Hush Heath Winery in great detail, over the telephone on Wednesday 6th February and in person on Friday 8th February in the presence of other people.

Mr Balfour-Lynn said that he only wants the sale of alcohol to the general public at the winery on Fridays and Saturdays 11.00 to 17.00 from mid March to September.

He only wishes to sell his own wine, nothing else, from his existing tasting room, not a shop.

The reason Mr Balfour-Lynn has given for not wanting the sale of alcohol to the general public, from the winery on Mondays to Thursdays is because he states it would not be possible because we are wine making these 4 days a week. I assume because of health and safety reasons.

He does not want the general public around on Sundays because he is at home on Sundays and he would not want people around when he is there.

Mr Balfour-Lynn originally intended just to apply for a limited licence to sell alcohol from the winery on Friday and Saturday 11.00 to 17.00 mid March to September but he was advised by your licensing office to apply for a much broader licence to give him greater flexibility. So if a member of the general public turned up on a day when they were closed for the odd bottle of wine he could sell this without the risk of prosecution. On the other hand you could ask the member of the public to come back on a day when you were open.

The general public turning up on a day when the winery is closed, uninvited, entering an agricultural yard with tractors and forklift trucks in regular use and the winery in full production is not an option.

So a small notice on the entrance gate showing opening times would stop this. Mr Balfour-Lynn within his application has stated in (a) (b) (d) of Section (P) that there will be limited opening hours, limited access to the public and supply of alcohol will be restricted to the public tasting samples.

I live next door to Hush Heath winery and would be happy to accept Mr Balfour-Lynns application for the sale of alcohol from the winery for Friday and Saturday 11.00 to 17.00 mid march to September, which is what he tells me he originally wanted prior to your licensing office giving him advice to the contrary.

I would appreciate you taking into consideration the fact that Mr Balfour-Lynn does not want to open to the public 7 days a week and all of the local residents feel the same. So would it be possible to issue a licence for just Fridays and Saturdays 11.00 to 17.00 mid March to September.

Please consider neighbours and other local residents for the following reasons.

PUBLIC SAFETY

The roads around Hush Heath winery are in the main single track country lanes with no passing points and deep drainage ditches either side of the road.

Passing on coming traffic is a case of using muddy verges at the side of the road and having to steer too close for comfort to the deep drainages ditches, which results in numerous cars falling into the deep drainage ditches.

The increased traffic going to the winery is going to increase the existing traffic congestion and increase the danger around the lanes.

PUBLIC NUISANCE

The increase in noise from the traffic will have an effect upon all the local residents and will effect their current peaceful lifestyle.

The Licensing Committee must look at the long term implications of this winery. The winery was granted planning permission to produce wine on the estate of Hush Heath and up to now this has been proved to be a good decision and has had little effect upon the area or local residents.

We are now looking at the start of this agricultural based winery going a small step towards retail sales.

This area that we live in is not appropriate for the likes of a busy retail winery like Lamberhurst or Chapel Down in Tenterden because our area is one of the last beautiful peaceful rural places left in Kent. To have a successful retail winery like Lamberhurst or Chapel Down you must have good access roads i.e A or B roads that also benefit from passing trade.

If you do grant a limited licence for Friday and Saturday 11.00 to 17.00 mid March to September, I feel that it must stop there because if you grant a licence for 7 days a week this will constitute a major change of use, that must only be considered via a full planning application which would then give local residents an opportunity to object if they wanted. If you grant a 7 day licence this would be a back door way of getting a major change of use from agriculture to retail without full planning permission,



HUMAN RIGHTS

Article 8

- 1. Everyone has the right to respect for his private and family life, his home and his correspondence.

The preceding provisions shall not, however, in any way impair the right of a State to enforce such laws as it deems necessary to control the use of property in accordance with the general interest or to secure the payment of taxes or other contributions or penalties.

Article 6(1)

In the determination of his civil rights and obligations or of any criminal charge against him, everyone is entitled to a fair and public hearing within a reasonable time by an independent and impartial tribunal established by law. Judgement shall be pronounced publicly but the press and public may be excluded from all or part of the trial in the interest of morals, public order or national security in a democratic society, where the interests of juveniles or the protection of the private life of the parties so require, or to the extent strictly necessary in the opinion of the court in special circumstances where publicity would prejudice the interests of justice.

Article 10

- 3. Everyone has the right to freedom of expression. This right shall include freedom to hold opinions and to receive and impart information and ideas without interference by public authority and regardless of frontiers. This Article shall not prevent States from requiring the licensing of broadcasting, television or cinema enterprises.
- 4. The exercise of these freedoms, since it carries with it duties and responsibilities, may be subject to such formalities, conditions, restrictions or penalties as are prescribed by law and are necessary in a democratic society, in the interests of national security, territorial integrity or public safety, for the prevention of disorder or crime, for the protection of health or morals, for the protection of the reputation or rights of others, for preventing the disclosure of information received in confidence, or for maintaining the authority and impartiality of the judiciary.

In the following order:

- **Each Responsible Authority**
- **x** Each Interested Party
- **X** The Applicant

End of Hearing

- The Chairman will ask the members of the sub-committee if they have any final questions for any party to the hearing.
- The Chairman will ask the legal advisor whether there are any further matters to be raised or resolved before the hearing is closed.
- The Chairman will bring the hearing to a close and shall declare that the subcommittee will retire, to private session, to consider the application, all relevant representations, evidence, the relevant extracts of Licensing Authority's Statement of Licensing Policy, the relevant extracts of the National Guidance issued under section 182 of The Licensing Act 2003 and the licensing objectives under the Licensing Act 2003.
- The Chairman shall invite the legal advisor to remain with the sub-committee during its deliberations and ask all other persons to withdraw from the room.

The Decision

The Chairman shall declare in public session:

- The sub-committee's determination.
- All parties to the hearing will receive a copy of the written Determination Notice regarding the sub-committee's determination.
- All parties may appeal against the sub-committee's decision within 21 days beginning with the day on which the appellant is notified of the Licensing Authority's written determination. Appeals must be lodged with the Magistrates' Court. Parties should be aware that the Magistrates Court may make an order with respect to costs on any appeal.
- The hearing is formally closed.
