21% decrease in chewing gum measured after second count








Moving from Reactive to Responsive

Dog Fouling

- Estimates put the UK dog population between 6.5 and 7.4 million, producing 1,000 tonnes of faeces every day.
- Most dog owners are responsible and clean up after their pets, but a small minority continue to cause problems
- Exempted land:
 - Carriageways with a speed limit of more than 40 mph
 - Land used for agriculture or woodlands
- Once bagged, dog faeces is considered as litter
- Maidstone Borough Council maintains 350 dog bins and thousands of other bins in the borough
- Parish Councils are starting to buy and maintain their own dog bins
